OVERALL DESCRIPTION	Topics Addressed
The OSEP Technical Assistance Center on Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) was initially funded in 1998. In October of 2018 a new five-year funding cycle was launched. The purpose of the new Center is to improve the capacity of SEAs, LEAs, and schools to establish, scale-up, and sustain the PBIS framework to (a) scale up tier 2 and 3 systems to improve outcomes for students with or at-risk for disabilities, (b) enhance school climate and school safety, and (c) improve conditions for learning to promote the well-being of all students.	 High fidelity, scaled, and sustained implementation of the PBIS framework, with particular focus on implementation of Tier 2 and 3 PBIS systems and positive outcomes for students with disabilities. Building systems capacity and student success (including opioid abuse and prevention) across a range of schools and educational settings. Conditions for learning improvements.
